The assassination of Charles McNeil

1843- Ansel Ryder shot Owen Haymond in Smith's Tavern in Newark after a disagreement over a joke made by Haymond (*who was not seriously injured*). Ryder rode home and barricaded himself in his house. An enraged crowd gathered around his house trying to apprehend the assailant.

Charles McNeil cont.

During the fracas Ryder shot a second man, Charles McNeil, in the chest and a few days later he died of his wounds. Ryder was captured after the mob broke through his door using a log as a battering ram. He was brought to Yorkville where the county sheriff confined the prisoner in the attic of his house. Ryder then jumped out the attic window and broke his leg. Although Ryder was captured again and taken to court.

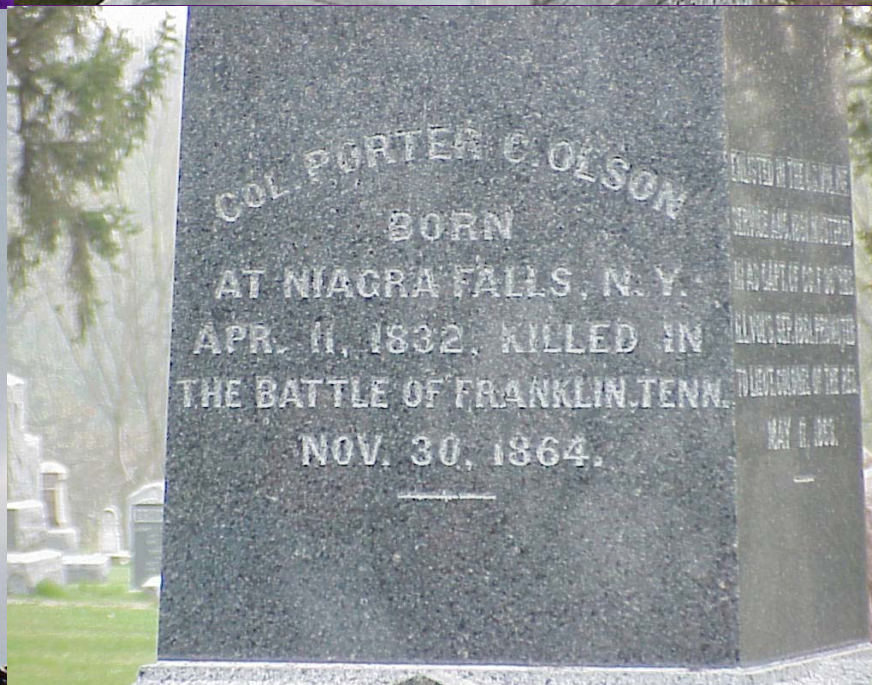

The Tombstone Reads:

Born in Mononochala now Marion County, VA, May 1792. Removed to Illinois in 1829. Made the First Farm in Kendall County in 1831. Was driven away by hostile savages and with loss of most his property and saved the lives of his family and himself by extraordinary courage and presence of mind May 16, 1831. Returned the following Autumn and acquired an ample competence. Reared a large family in credit and comfort. Attained a good old age and died Nov. 20, 1869. He was an affectionate husband, a kind father, a faithful friend, a good neighbor, a true patient, a brave large hearted man. Filial affection rears this monument.
